About Us

The Keep it Clean Partnership (KICP) is a collaborative program based in Boulder County with participation from our local municipalities. These communities originally came together over 20 years ago to collaborate on stormwater management, and in the years since we have expanded our work to include broader watershed level efforts.

Our staff facilitate collaboration on water quality issues between our partner communities and with other organizations with the goal of improving watershed health. We coordinate training events for stormwater professionals and perform watershed outreach on behalf of our partner communities. By working together with local governments and other organizations throughout the Boulder St. Vrain basin, we can increase our impact and make progress towards a healthier watershed.

Stormwater

Our stormwater program provides opportunities for staff from the Keep it Clean Partnership communities to coordinate watershed-wide programs and training opportunities. In 2023, two training events reached 165 people from 43 organizations.




Watershed

Our watershed program coordinates water quality sampling throughout the Boulder St. Vrain watershed and continues to support various efforts to monitor and improve water quality.

Monitoring Program

The Keep it Clean Partnership communities monitor 17 water quality parameters at over 40 monitoring sites. An interactive data dashboard will be available in 2024, which will allow stakeholders and the public to more easily view water quality data in our watershed.



Monitoring the Coal Creek Ecosystem following the Marshall Fire

This year we continued to support the research team from the University of Colorado conducting water quality monitoring in Coal Creek in and around the burned areas following the Marshall Fire. The results will help us better understand fire-related impacts to our streams and how we can protect them. 
